



Our mission is to foster a collaborative ecosystem where talent, technology, and community converge. We do this by:


- Creating spaces that empower innovation offering flexible coworking environments, tech-enabled workspaces, and business incubation resources tailored to rural professionals.

# **Executive Summary**



In Year One of the Opportunity Now grant, Emergent Campus made significant strides in transforming rural workforce development through bold partnerships, targeted programming, and community-driven innovation.

With a focus on connecting rural talent to meaningful tech and business opportunities, we successfully launched a regional ecosystem that supports both learners and employers. Our work prioritized real-world experience, employer engagement, and inclusive access to opportunity—particularly for youth, underrepresented populations, and jobseekers in Southern Colorado.

#### Key Highlights:

#### • Launched Rural Talent Pipelines

• We piloted hands-on workforce experiences across sectors like software, cybersecurity, digital marketing, and entrepreneurship—offering job shadowing, internships, mentorship, and tech career exposure to students and adults in Fremont and Las Animas counties.

#### Activated Employer and Community Partnerships

• Through collaboration with local governments, school districts, chambers of commerce, and rural employers, we bridged the gap between education and employment, bringing industry-aligned programming to rural learners.

#### • Built Infrastructure for Long-Term Impact

 We strengthened the backbone of our rural ecosystem with dedicated space, staff, and programming at both our Florence and Trinidad campuses—ensuring sustainability beyond the Opportunity Now grant period.

#### • Awarded U.S. Department of Labor Grant

 A major milestone this year was receiving a \$5.75 million dollar Department of Labor Grant through the Strengthening Community Colleges Training program in partnership with key local stakeholders. This new federal investment expands our reach into high-demand advanced manufacturing careers while reinforcing our commitment to equitable access and regional impact.

Year One has laid a strong foundation. From building local capacity to national recognition, our progress reflects the growing belief that rural communities are not only capable—but critical—to Colorado's economic future. With continued momentum, we are well-positioned to scale our model, deepen partnerships, and deliver even greater impact in Year Two and beyond.



ACI Training Cohort

Emergent Campus offers a powerful lineup of programs designed to support workforce development, entrepreneurship, and career growth in rural communities. The Emergent Campus Professional Development Program provides comprehensive support for individuals at any stage of their career—whether just starting out or seeking a new direction. Through a personalized blend of resume coaching, job coaching, mentoring, interview preparation, and direct networking, participants receive targeted guidance to build confidence, sharpen job search skills, and expand their professional networks. Additional programs include the Women in Tech Network, which fosters connection and mentorship among women in technology, and the South Central Success Syndicate, a peer-driven cohort that empowers emerging entrepreneurs. The ACI Learning Cohort prepares participants for A+ IT certification, while certificate and skills-based training programs equip learners with industry-recognized credentials.

### **Programs in Numbers**

In the past year, Emergent Campus launched 10 brand-new programs aimed at empowering individuals through education, career development, and entrepreneurship. These programs have already engaged 75 participants, reflecting strong community interest and a growing impact across the region.





These numbers reflect the growing momentum of our mission—building meaningful pathways for rural talent. From first-time learners to seasoned professionals, participants are not only engaging, but many are returning for multiple programs. With the Emergent Campus Professional Development Program leading in enrollment, it's clear that our well-rounded, hands-on approach is meeting real community needs and inspiring continued participation.

### **Regional Partners**



The strength of Emergent Campus lies in its deep collaboration with a wide network of regional partners committed to transforming rural communities through education, innovation, and workforce development. Partners such as Canon City Schools, Fremont RE-1, Fremont RE-2, Trinidad School District #1, and the South Central BOCES play a critical role in shaping student pathways and career-connected learning. Institutions like Pueblo Community College and Trinidad State College align their offerings to meet workforce demands, creating a direct bridge from training to employment. Organizations like FEDC, Second-61, Empower Schools, South Central Tech Sector Partnership, and Data-Driven Economic Strategies provide strategic insight and access to industry opportunities, while initiatives like the Colorado Education Initiative and the Fremont Multidistrict Initiative support scalable models for educational innovation. Together, these partners form a powerful ecosystem united by a shared mission—to close the opportunity gap across the I-25 tech corridor and create sustainable, community-driven economic growth.



At the same time, we've continued expanding our internship efforts in Fremont County, deepening partnerships with local schools to grow a rural workforce pipeline that gives our students the chance to stay, thrive, and access high-paying, valuable careers right here at home. #### Goals for Year 2

In Year 2 of the Opportunity Now grant, we will build on the strong foundation established in our first year by expanding partnerships, scaling programs, and increasing our overall impact on the local workforce. Our focus will be on strengthening the connection between education and employment, ensuring that more residents, particularly those in rural and underserved areas, have access to the skills, resources, and opportunities they need to secure high-quality jobs.

We plan to deepen collaboration with employers, schools, and training providers to create more tailored pathways that align with industry demand. This will include expanding internship and apprenticeship opportunities, increasing access to short-term training, and providing upskilling options for current workers. As we progress through the year, we will also begin a strategic transition toward work under our new Department of Labor grant, with a focus on advanced manufacturing. This shift will allow us to leverage the momentum from Opportunity Now to further strengthen our talent pipeline, introduce specialized training programs, and prepare our region for growth in high-demand manufacturing careers. Through these efforts, we aim to grow our reach, strengthen local capacity, and create lasting economic opportunities within our region.


#### Summary
